



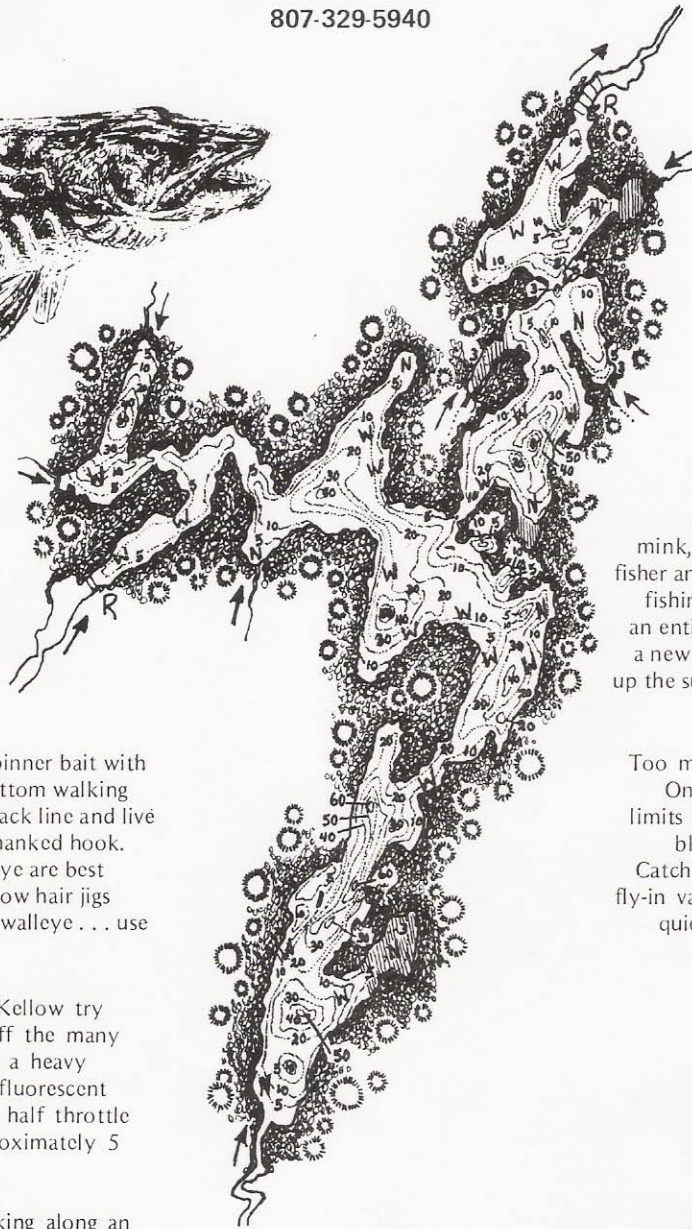
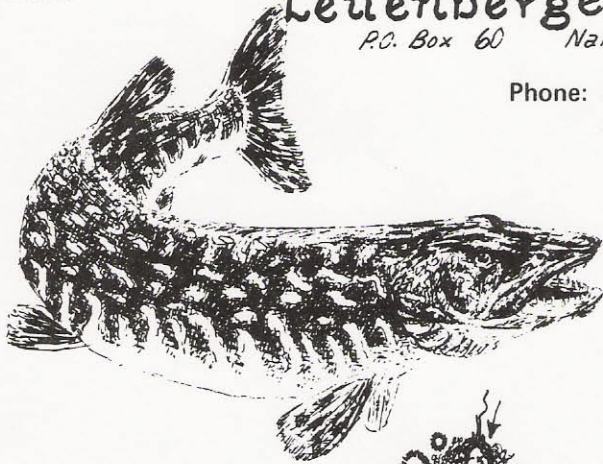

How-To Fishing Tips:

Kellow has produced many a large northern pike despite its continually changing hard bottom structure. First lure choice would be a daredevil spoon in orange fluorescent stripes. #2 would be a black bass spinner bait with orange blades. For walleye use a bottom walking sinker (Bait-Walker), 24 inch dropback line and live or frozen minnows on a #2 short shanked hook. Sinker weight should be 1 oz. Walleye are best found between 15 and 25 feet. Yellow hair jigs tipped with meat will also work on walleye . . . use 1/4 or 3/8 oz.

It is suggested the first timer to Kellow try speed-trolling for northern pike off the many rocky points. For best results use a heavy gauge spoon in an orange or red fluorescent color. Motor speed should rest at half throttle if a 6 horse is being used — approximately 5 to 7 miles an hour.

Walleye anglers might consider taking along an assortment of pork rind in jars. Try some of the new yellows, purples, red as well as white. Attach a jig for added flare.
